- 1. Health Care Access and Refugees with Special Needs:** Refugees have convenient access to medical, dental, and mental health services in Dearborn and the greater Detroit area through a variety of health care providers. There are very few conditions or special needs that the agency is unable to accommodate. USCRI Dearborn is able to serve refugees with special physical and mental health needs or disabilities through its partnership with the ACCESS Community Health Center. Clients with special needs are connected with ongoing services as needed throughout and after the R&P period. While housing is available for families with up to seven people, affordable and accessible housing for clients with disabilities is limited. For this reason, USCRI Dearborn finds it challenging to accept clients with physical disabilities who require disability-accessible housing. USCRI Dearborn is conducting outreach to increase access.
- 2. Community Engagement:** In FY 2016, USCRI Dearborn hosted a symposium on Syrian refugees attended by community leaders from a wide variety of organizations and backgrounds. The event enabled local service providers such as the Department of Health and Human Services and school districts, to better prepare for and assist Syrian refugees. USCRI Dearborn noted more efficient processing and approval for benefits for Syrian cases following the symposium. USCRI Dearborn also invited six state representatives and senators to its office to discuss resettlement and meet with clients. This meeting resulted in

officials supporting the agency’s efforts, and subsequently, more positive visibility for the agency and its clients throughout the community. USCRI Dearborn’s FY 2016 outreach efforts also resulted in increase in cash and in-kind donations, as well as in volunteer interest. In FY 2017, USCRI Dearborn plans to develop partnerships with five local schools and other organizations to host at least three donation drives and fundraising events. The goal of these events is to increase community awareness and partnership and to provide clients with needed extra support, with a target of \$50,000, \$25,000 of which will be used for vehicles to transport clients. The agency also hopes to continue to increase community outreach efforts by hosting at least two events such as this year’s symposium, with the targeted goal of developing relationships with 20 new landlords. The number of attendees of the symposium and landlords recruited will be used to assess the success of the outreach strategy.

- 3. Financial Resources:** USCRI Dearborn receives funding from private individuals, religious institutions, corporations, and foundations to supplement funds for the R&P program. USCRI Dearborn utilizes contributions to meet emergency or critical needs of refugee clients. The Nissan Foundation provides funding for outreach and advocacy, as well as classes and workshops for refugees. Volunteers provide clients with transportation and basic needs support.
