1. **Health Care Access and Refugees with Special Needs:** Within the proposed caseload for FY2016 there are no conditions, generally speaking, that the agency is not able to accommodate.
2. **Public Outreach:** During FY2015 and extending into FY2016, CCSEM has and will continue to focus on improving outreach activities through its Program Director, Community Outreach Coordinator, and Marketing and Development Directors by:
  - Networking and collaborating with other service providers and community based organizations where needs, services, and updates are shared and where collaboration and coordination of service delivery is improved resulting in efficiencies and

reducing duplication of efforts. For example, Lutheran Social Services of Michigan, the US Committee for Refugees and Immigrants, and CCSEM conduct monthly education workshops for refugees that reinforce the cultural orientation curriculum.

- Relationships with churches and faith based institutions have been a big focus for CCSEM, where its Marketing and Development Directors assisted in increasing the Christmas giving tree donations to about \$41,000 in value (compared to \$13,000 in previous years). This donation will enable CCSEM to continue to furnish refugee homes with the necessary kitchen and household items throughout the year.
- CCSEM is a Welcoming Michigan Committee member for Sterling Height, Clinton Township and Macomb County. Through these committees and their activities, we were able to reach a larger audience including the media which increased refugee awareness, support, advocacy and volunteer recruitment.
- In collaboration with the other resettlement agencies and the State Refugee Coordinator, we were able to coordinate our Community Consultations as a group where we quarterly discuss various updates, concerns, and challenges along with solutions and action plans. Community groups, municipalities, educators, health professionals, state and government agency personnel were able to increase our community capacity and ability to diversify our refugee groups in the future.
- CCSEM was able to lead the Metro Detroit Housing Committee that consists of members of resettlement agencies, community organizations, city and county personnel who are focusing on addressing the accessibility of affordable housing for refugees in the area in preparation for the resettlement of non US tie cases.
